

#### PAST SIMPLE or PRESENT PERFECT?

- We use the Past Simple to talk about an action that was completed at a definite time in the past.
- With the **Present Perfect** the action either happened at an indefinite time in the past and has a result in the present, or indicates multiple events that happened from the past to the present.

## Compare these examples:

I went to New York in 1987, it was fantastic. How long did you live in Venice for?

I've been to New York before, it's a great city. How long have you lived here?

We saw that film last month. He came here seven years ago

I've watched that film three times. He has lived here for seven years

## PRESENT SIMPLE, CONTINUOUS OR PERFECT?

- The Present Simple expresses regular or repeated actions in the present or permanent situations.
- The Present Continuous is used to talk about activities we are in the middle of doing
- The Present Perfect we are normally talking about an activity or multiple activities that started from the past until now, or something that happened at an indefinite time in the past which has an effect on the present.

#### Compare these examples:

They study German twice a week

He starts work at 8.30 every week day.

They're studying German this year.

This week he's starting work at 10am

They've studied German for one year. He's just started work at a new company.

I often read on the train to work. Water boils at 100 degrees centigrade

I'm reading a book by George Orwell I'm boiling the water to make a cup of tea.

I've read several books by Toni Morrison I've boiled the water, now I'll make the tea.



# Time Expressions

Time expressions are very important in indicating which tense or aspect to use.

Present & Past Simple	Present Continuous	Present Perfect	Past Simple
Usually	Now	Since/For	Last week/month/year
Always	Currently	Already/Yet	Ago
Often	At the moment	Just	Previously
Sometimes	Today	Today	In + month/year
Never	This week/month/year	This week/month/year	On + date
Every day/week/month		Ever/Never
